Request for Approval of one (1) Class C Loan for 'Aina Ho'okupu O 10 Kilauea 11 12 Chairperson Hurd announced that she will follow the order of the items on the agenda 13 because there may be testifiers that arrive later due to the Plant Quarantine Item being 14 last on the agenda. 15 16 Jillian Scheibe, Ag Loan Division, presented testimony as submitted. 17 18 Motion to Approve: Gomes/Grewal 19 20 Public Testimony: 21 Yoshi, CEO for 'Aina Ho'okupu O Kilauea (AHK), thanked the board and staff for their 22 support. 23 24 Hunter Heaivilin, Hawaii Farmers Union, spoke in support expressing excitement about state 25 funds supporting food hubs. 26 27 **Board Discussion:** 28 Member Gomes questioned the applicant about their livestock processing plans. Yoshito Lo explained their current custom-exempt slaughter process and their goal to 29 30 achieve a USDA inspection stamp to address the lack of small animal processing on 31 Kauai. Member Gomes also asked for clarification on the projected 'two and a half fold' 32 increase in protein production, which staff confirmed was the total for all proteins (lamb, 33 chicken, beef, pork). 34 35 Member Young, who is on the HIR Investment Committee and whose loan is contingent 36 on board approval, recused himself from voting but spoke in support of the project. He 37 highlighted the project's organic growth, its high-traffic location with untapped tourist potential, and the owner's innovative thinking in developing turnkey farm projects for the 38 39 community. 40 41 Vote: Approved – 7; Recused - 1 (Young)

Request for Approval of one (1) Loan Guaranty for 'Aina Ho'okupu O 2 Kilauea. 3 4 Jillian Scheibe, Ag Loan Division, presented testimony as submitted. 5 6 Motion to Approve: Gomes/Takemoto 7 8 Public Testimony: 9 Yoshi, CEO for AHK, testified that their vertical integration model has been successful, 10 forecasting \$1 million in gross revenue for the year, with strong community support and minimal 11 waste 12 **Board Discussion:** 13 14 15 Staff recommended approval, citing the client's proven food aggregation ability, adequate collateral, community impact, and historical/projected cash flow 16 17 18 Member Young recused himself but commented positively on the loan guarantee 19 process, stating it allows community lenders to take necessary risks to innovate the 20 agricultural system. 21 22 Vote: Approved – 7; Recused – 1 (Young) 23 24 B. Request for Approval to Address Delinquent Irrigation Bills for the 28 Moloka'i Irrigation System 29 30 Brian Kau, Agricultural Resource Management Division, presented testimony as submitted. 31 32 33 Motion to Approve: Gomes/Grewal 34 35 Public Testimony: Tara Rojas commented about the impact on homesteading families who rely on the 36 37 water for subsistence. 38 39 Chairperson Hurd clarified that the fees are for the delivery infrastructure, not the water itself. 40 41 42 Lori Buchanan supported the plan but hoped the department would assist users with the

Lei Kalipi questioned the lack of public meetings and community input before the proposal.

Godfrey Akaka represented the Native Hawaiian Gathering Rights Association. He questioned the per-gallon pricing model if the charge is only for transmission, suggesting a flat fee instead.

Kunani Nihipali said this discussion needs to be carried out on their island, face-to-face. He said they need to have this discussion so they can clarify and make sure the use of the Molokai Irrigation System (MIS) comes back to the Native Hawaiian people.

 Several speakers urged the board to defer the motion. They argued about the necessity of face-to-face community meetings on their island to discuss the complex issues surrounding the MIS, its history, and water rates. They highlighted a lack of trust with the Department of Agriculture and expressed a desire for the system to be returned to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL), for which it was originally intended. Testifiers felt the current billing structure was unfair, charging by volume instead of a fixed rate for transmission, especially for homesteaders and farmers.

Board Discussion:

Mr. Kau clarified that the motion is not a rate increase but a beneficial measure to address and nullify approximately \$1.5 million in longstanding delinquencies, some over 20 years old. The plan is to credit the delinquent accounts of current users, giving them a 'fresh slate' at no cost, provided they update their contact information. He assured that there would be zero ramifications for those in arrears who cooperate. He also mentioned that the department has been working closely with DHHL and that a meeting was held on this matter on Molokai on August 12.

Board Member Gomes expressed the need for on-the-ground dialogue and transparency to help farmers.

Member Young discussed the MIS issue, acknowledging the complexity and sensitivity of water-related matters. He emphasized the importance of clearing long-standing delinquencies to prevent negative impacts on individuals' credit scores and to move forward with a clean slate. Member Young expressed a desire to address the issue promptly to avoid further delays and to ensure that the community is not left waiting for solutions. He recognized the need for better communication and engagement with the Molokai community, suggesting that the Board of Agriculture could improve its efforts to listen and address concerns. Member Young supported moving forward with the current relief motion while also considering ways to address broader issues and improve the relationship with the community.

Board Member Oswald discussed the MIS water issue, emphasizing the importance of addressing long-standing delinquencies, some of which date back decades. He highlighted the need for a fair and equitable solution, expressing concern about the potential backlash from those who have been paying their bills when others' debts are forgiven. Oswald stressed the importance of ensuring that homesteaders, who have been waiting for water meters for many years, are prioritized. He also mentioned the critical nature of water access for subsistence farming on Molokai, where people rely on the land for food. Oswald advocated for a clear, step-by-step plan to address these issues and ensure transparency and fairness in the process.

C. PLANT INDUSTRY DIVISION

Plant Quarantine Branch

1. Request for Review and Adoption of an Interim Rule Pursuant to Hawaii Revised Statutes §150A-9.5, to Restrict the Transportation of Plants, Soil, Gravel, and Other Coconut Rhinoceros Beetle (CRB) Host Material Including Decomposing Plant Material Such as Compost, Wood or Tree Chips, and Mulch, Plant Propagation Medial and Other Items Comprised of Decomposing Organic Plant Material Such as Landscaping Material or Erosion Control Socks, to the Island of Molokai From Any Other Area in the State to Prevent the Spread of CRB

Jonathan Ho, Plant Quarantine Branch (PQB), presented testimony as submitted.

Motion to Approve: Gomes/Young

Public Testimony:

Kunani Nihipali testified on the interim rule regarding the Coconut Rhinoceros Beetle (CRB), emphasizing the urgency and importance of protecting Molokai from this pest. He expressed gratitude for the support received from the community and various committees for their petition. Kunani highlighted the inadequacy of current measures, noting that CRB continues to spread despite existing regulations. He questioned the necessity of importing gravel to Molokai, given the island's own resources, and expressed concerns about the potential for CRB to be present in imported materials. Kunani urged the board to support their original petition as submitted, emphasizing the need for decisive action to prevent the pest from reaching Molokai and protect the island's environment and resources.

The public testimony for the CRB interim rule was largely in support of implementing stricter measures to prevent the pest from reaching Molokai. Testifiers emphasized the urgency of the situation, highlighting the potential devastation CRB could cause to the island's environment and agriculture. There was a call for more community involvement and transparency in the decision-making process, with suggestions for town hall meetings to ensure the community's voice is heard. Overall, the testimony reflected a strong desire to take proactive steps to safeguard Molokai from the CRB threat.

Board Discussion:

Member Young favored a more restrictive rule including gravel due to difficulty assuring origin and cleanliness of aggregate piles.

Member Ley requested clarification on Coordinating Group on Alien Pest Species (CGAPS) comments in its written testimony. Mr. Ho summarized CGAPS' suggested edits (which generally aligned with Appendix E of PQB's submittal to the Board, but removed gravel and included other wording changes).

 Counsel clarified with Mr. Ho that: (1) Appendix E was the Plant and Animal Advisory Committee's recommended draft to the Board; (2) Appendix E was substantially similar to the draft submitted by the Nihipalis, with the addition of a severability clause; and (3) PQB's submittal to the Board recommended further revisions for Appendix E, but these were only in the written portion submitted by PQB and were not included in Appendix E.

Member Grewal thanked staff and the Molokai community, emphasizing vigilance even after the rule is implemented.

Member Oswald noted the New Zealand community's motivated response and recorded that a Maui County representative tried to call in but was unable.

Board members discussed which version to adopt; counsel clarified that technically PQB's submittal to the Board included recommended changes to Appendix E.

Chairperson Hurd clarified that the motion that the board is considering is as written in the board submittal and as shown on the agenda unless the board wants to make any changes.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

1. NON-ACTION ITEM: Invasive Species Action Plan Updates

Jonathan Ho, Plant Quarantine Branch, presented new business item.

Jonathan Ho provided an update on the invasive species action plan, highlighting a recent trip to New Zealand by a delegation from Hawaii. The delegation included state senators, representatives, and members from various departments and organizations involved in biosecurity. The trip focused on learning about New Zealand's biosecurity strategies, including their use of transitional facilities, pest management, and incursion responses. The delegation visited several sites, including the Port of Auckland and New Zealand Post, to observe their operations and biosecurity measures. They also engaged with the Waikoto Regional Council to learn about pest management strategies for species like wallabies and Asian freshwater clams. The visit emphasized the importance of shared responsibility and targeted outreach in managing biosecurity threats. The update underscored the need for Hawaii to adopt similar comprehensive and coordinated approaches to biosecurity.

Public Testimony:

Vicky Takamine asked if there were any Federal Government or USDA staff that went on this New Zealand trip because that should require Federal Government involvement.

1 Mr. Ho said there was no federal representation. 2 3 Christine, the CEO of Stargazer Industries Hawaii, testified about her efforts to start a 4 new industry using eucalyptus trees on Hawaii Island. She explained that her company 5 began shipping eucalyptus wood chips in April, but initial attempts failed due to insufficient fumigation levels. After switching to a different fumigator, they achieved the 6 7 necessary levels to meet state agricultural approval for transporting the wood chips. 8 Christine highlighted the need for clear definitions in regulations regarding different 9 types of wood chips, as her coarse wood chips, which are larger and not shredded, 10 differ from finer materials that could host pests like the CRB. She requested that 11 regulations consider these distinctions, especially since her product is legally 12 transportable to California. 13 14 Kunani Nihipali asked how the Maori people were involved in the New Zealand trip.
