36 A. AGRICULTURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT DIVISION

38 1. Request for Approval to: (1) Accept, After the Fact, Annual Lease Rent

2 Kevin Moore, Agricultural Resource Management Division, presented testimony as  
3 submitted.

4  
5 Motion to Approve: Ley/Gomes

6  
7 Public Testimony:

8 Milton Colman, the lessee, requested a deferment. He stated he is currently overseas  
9 and his email was compromised so he did not receive recent communications from the  
10 department. He cited recent family deaths and health issues as contributing factors and  
11 requested three months to fix the current issues.

12  
13 Tara Rojas supported Mr. Colman and urged the board to support the “generational  
14 ohana” and prioritize food security.

15  
16 Kevin Chang said he believes the request for extension is worthy and knows Mr.  
17 Coleman’s family.

18  
19 Kuikeokalani Kamakea-Ohelo expressed strong support for deferment. He has been  
20 involved for the last 10 years in planting food on the property and supporting the  
21 Coleman family in their efforts to increase food and cultural resource production.

22  
23 Board Discussion:

24 Board Member Gomes sympathized with the testimony but questioned the lessee’s  
25 payment history. He asked Mr. Moore when the last payment was made and its amount.  
26 He also inquired about reports of squatters on the property and whether the lessee had  
27 provided any written proof of the financial backing he mentioned.

28  
29 Mr. Moore stated that the lessee has a long-standing delinquency in rent. The most  
30 recent partial payment against rent was in June 2023. He confirmed receiving a report  
31 about potential squatters from a neighbor but was unable to conduct an inspection as  
32 they could not contact the lessee.

33  
34 Board Member Young recalled previous discussions about the challenges of evaluating  
35 permaculture models, which don’t look like conventional agriculture. They sympathized  
36 with Mr. Coleman’s situation but noted the significant delinquency is unfair to other  
37 lessees.

38  
39 Chairperson Hurd proposed a deferment to next month’s meeting (February). She  
40 requested Mr. Coleman or his representative to present a detailed plan to address the  
41 delinquency.

42

1 Board Member Ley withdrew her motion in favor of the Chairperson's proposed  
2 direction.

3  
4 The board deferred the item to the next board meeting.

5  
6  
7 2. Request for Amendment of Prior Board Action of October 28, 2025, Item  
8 IV.B.4, Approved as Amended, as That Action Relates to the Modification  
9 of General Lease No. S-3138; Hawaii Land & Livestock, LLC, Lessee.

16 Kevin Moore, Agricultural Resource Management Division, presented testimony as  
17 submitted.

18  
19 Motion to Approve: Gomes/Moniz

20  
21 Public Testimony:

22 Tara Rojas stated the presentation gave more clarity but expressed concern for the  
23 record. She questioned the decision to prioritize renewable energy over livestock food  
24 resources. She took issue with the DLNR making decisions via executive order to  
25 reduce the agricultural land from over 100 acres to 9 acres for renewable energy. She  
26 stated her opposition to prioritizing the "benefit of the state" and industry over food  
27 production, especially when best practices like Korean Natural Farming could be used.  
28 She highlighted the conflict between land for food and land for renewable energy.

29  
30 Board Discussion:

31 The board recognized the lessee who was present in the room.

32  
33 Aaron Eddington, Hawaii Land and Livestock, explained they only need nine acres  
34 behind the existing beef harvest facility for pens and overflow cattle. They requested the  
35 removal of the right to have the property taken for a renewable project to gain the  
36 security needed to invest in the land. They confirmed the lease amendment is approved  
37 by the Department of Ag, this board, and DLNR but has not yet been executed.

38  
39 Board Member Dave Smith summarized that Department of Land and Natural  
40 Resources (DLNR) would retain rights over the 100 acres but give up the right over the  
41 9.3 acres, which would be added to the adjacent Hawaii Land and Livestock LLC lease.

42

1 Board Member Moniz asked if the new language would prohibit the lessee from  
2 developing their own renewable energy project for their own use. He also asked if the  
3 executive order requires the lessee to get permission from DLNR.

4  
5 Mr. Moore responded that it would not prohibit them and no permission is needed if the  
6 project supports the agricultural purpose of the lease.

9 Board Discussion:

10 Board Member Gomes asked if the process for handling defaults could be streamlined  
11 to act sooner.

12

13 Ms. Ah Yo explained that staff first tries to work directly with lessees to bring them into  
14 compliance, including helping them assign the lease if needed. In Mr. Garcia's case, he  
15 had shown some positive movement before struggling again in the last year, which  
16 prompted the current action.

17

18 Chairperson Hurd commented that streamlining has been considered previously, and  
19 the most direct way would be to strictly follow HAR and HRS rules.

20

24 7. Request for Approval to Extend Authorization of Temporary Access to the  
25 Waimea Irrigation System to Preserve Animal Life and Setting of a Delivery  
26 Rate; Waimea, Island of Hawai'i, Hawai'i

28 Brian Kau, Agricultural Resource Management Division, presented testimony as  
29 submitted.

30

31 Motion to Approve: Gomes/Ley

32

33 Public Testimony:

34 Tara Rojas commented on the importance of water conservation. She urged the board  
35 to remember that water is a critical issue in Hawai'i, especially during a drought, and to  
36 rule accordingly on all issues, particularly when uses other than agriculture are  
37 proposed.

38

39 Board Discussion:

40 Board Member Moniz announced he would be abstaining from the vote but wanted to  
41 make comments. He emphasized the persistent and worsening drought on the island,  
42 which has lasted for over a year. He expressed appreciation for the department's efforts  
43 to make water available for emergency livestock hauling. He noted that while some  
44 areas are receiving rain, the area in question has not.

1  
2 Board Member Gomes asked if emergency water would still be available after April 30,  
3 2026, timeframe if the drought continues. He highlighted the severe drought conditions  
4 in Maui. He also asked for clarification on the 10,000-gallon cap, questioning if it was  
5 per applicant or total.

6  
7 Mr. Kau stated that the 10,000-gallon cap is per applicant, per day. Regarding the  
8 timeframe, he explained that staff will take the situation under advisement as the time  
9 comes, as they are trying to avoid the perception of a permanent, long-term solution.  
10 The goal is to address the emergency as it comes and return to the board for  
11 reasonable time extensions. In response to what happens if an applicant exceeds the  
12 10,000-gallon daily limit, he said they have not had to deal with that issue as usage has  
13 been well under the cap, but it would be something they would need to address if it  
14 occurs.

15  
16 Board Member Young asked about the application and approval process for the water  
17 subsidy, wanting to ensure that smaller providers have equal access. He inquired about  
18 who is currently using the service.

19  
20 Mr. Kau replied that there has only been one user so far, with a second person showing  
21 interest but not yet taking water. He stated they have not done public notice to manage  
22 the resource carefully and ensure primary users (diversified agricultural farmers) have  
23 what they need. He said the people in the area are likely aware of the opportunity.

24  
25 Board Member Moniz clarified that he was the second potential user, having made the  
26 request before joining the board. He explained that both he and the other user were  
27 being proactive during the extended drought. His concern was having a pre-approved  
28 backup water source in case his primary county water source went down. He suggested  
29 that other ranchers in the Hawaiian Home area should be made aware of this option. He  
30 reiterated that while the water collection area may be receiving rain, the livestock-raising  
31 area is not.

32  
33 Board Member Takemoto asked if the department must come to the board every time  
34 an emergency water request is made or if there are emergency rules allowing staff to  
35 act independently.

36  
37 Mr. Kau stated that, to his knowledge, the law grants DAB the authority to provide relief  
38 in an emergency, but there is no blanket authorization for staff to make such decisions  
39 independently, especially as it could involve taking water away from other users (though  
40 that is not the case here).

41  
42 Vote: Approved: 8-1 (Abstain – Moniz)

43

1 Chairperson Hurd stated that she will be taking the agenda items out of order and will  
2 hear the Old Business item next.

3  
4 Agenda item V.1 was taken out of order and heard after agenda item IV.A.7.

5  
6 V. OLD BUSINESS

- 7  
8 1. Update on Plan to Address Delinquent Irrigation Bills for the Moloka'i Irrigation  
9 System, as Presented to the Board of Agriculture and Biosecurity on  
10 September 23, 2025

11  
12 Brian Kau, Agricultural Resource Management Division, presented the Old Business as  
13 submitted.

14  
15 Public Testimony:

16 Tara Rojas raised several points regarding the non-responsive accounts. She requested  
17 to see the form that was required to be signed and questioned if the non-responders  
18 could be Native Hawaiians who refuse to sign state documents and argued that they  
19 should not be denied access to water on their homeland. Mr. Rojas also suggested that  
20 they may not have seen the notices despite the outreach efforts.

21  
22 The Board resumed the remainder of the agenda, starting with agenda item IV.B.1.

23  
24 B. PLANT INDUSTRY DIVISION

25  
26 Plant Quarantine Branch

- 27  
28 1. Request for Review and Approval of the Petition From Megan Lamson,  
29 Hawai'i Wildlife Fund, and Leila Kealoha, Pōhaku Pelemaka, to Initiate  
30 Administrative Rulemaking to Implement an Interim Rule Pursuant to  
31 Hawaii Revised Statutes §150A-9.5, to Require a Department of  
32 Agriculture and Biosecurity Permit or Compliance Agreement for the  
33 Following, to Contain/Slow the Spread of CRB on Hawai'i Island:

39 of Decomposing Organic Plant Material Such as Landscaping Material or  
40 Erosion Control Socks From a Designated CRB Infested Area on Hawai'i  
41 Island to Any Other Area in the State; and  
42

- 1                                   b. Restrict the Transportation, Receipt, Processing, Sale, Barter, Donation,  
2                                   or Otherwise Giving Away of CRB Host Material Within the Designated  
3                                   CRB infested area on Hawai'i Island.  
4

5 Chairperson Hurd informed the board that there was an error on the petition that was  
6 submitted and that the name "Pokahu" should be "Pohaku".  
7

8 Jonathan Ho, Plant Quarantine Branch, presented testimony as submitted.  
9

10 Board Member Smith made a clarification that the request is to support the motion.  
11

12 Motion to Approve: Smith/Gomes  
13

14 Deputy Attorney General Waihee-Polk clarified that the staff recommendation is to *not*  
15 approve the petition as-is but to direct staff to proceed with the proper rulemaking  
16 process. She stated that for the board to approve the interim rule today would be illegal,  
17 as it requires a prior finding by the Plant and Animal Advisory Committee.  
18

19 Public Testimony:

20 Many speakers testified in support of the petition, urging the board for immediate action.  
21 Some speakers expressed frustration with failed promises regarding voluntary orders  
22 and interim rules and noted a lack of urgency.  
23

24 One testifier from Molokai commended staff and petitioners and noted the interim rule  
25 spurred a movement on Molokai where people are planting coconut trees again and  
26 educating children.  
27

28 Other testifiers argued that quarantine would be difficult and would cause economic  
29 shortfall for projects requiring landscaping. They called for proactive collaboration  
30 involving local staff and federal funding.  
31

32 Another testifier argued that the current strategy is failing and advocated for a fungus  
33 approach.  
34

35 Mr. Ho clarified that using this specific fungus is a restricted microorganism and warned  
36 that importing this without permit is a violation.  
37

38 Board Discussion:

39 Board Member Gomes stated he agreed with the staff's recommendation to work on the  
40 challenges in the proposed rule. He asked for a timeframe for when the issue would  
41 come back before the board.  
42

43 Mr. Ho responded that the earliest would be the next board meeting, but it would be  
very tight. He suggested the March board meeting would be more realistic.

1 Board Member Moniz asked Mr. Ho how long the CRB outbreak has been going on in  
2 West Hawaii and if the spread is contained within the known area and has not  
3 expanded outside of it.

4 Mr. Ho replied that it has been since 2023 and stated that the beetle has been found  
5 throughout the proposed quarantine area in varying levels.

6 Board Member Young thanked the testifiers. He shared a personal experience with  
7 dead coconut trees in Kona and agreed success depends on community participation.

8  
9 Board Member Smith said this is critical and that we cannot delay. He said we need to  
10 move forward, and we've waited way too long.

11  
12 Board Member Moniz recommended a multi-agency incident command system in place  
13 so there are more agencies to pull staff from.

14  
15 The board clarified that the motion would be to approve the petition to initiate  
16 administrative rulemaking and to return to the board in March.

17  
18 Vote: Approved; Unanimously

19

21  
22 VI. NEW BUSINESS

23  
24 1. NON-ACTION ITEM: Invasive Species Action Plan Updates

25  
26 Jonathan Ho, Plant Quarantine Branch, presented new business item.

27  
28 Mr. Ho provided a personnel and activity report. He said Dr. Richard Kim from the Plant  
29 Industry Division resigned on December 31<sup>st</sup> and Deputy Dean Matsukawa is currently  
30 the Acting Administrator.

31  
32 The Hawaii District, Oahu and Airport Supervisor positions were filled this month and  
33 started on January 5<sup>th</sup>. More interviews for the Plant and Insect Specialist will be  
34 conducted this week. Two more inspectors were hired on Maui and another two on  
35 Oahu.

36  
37 Mr. Ho said some new positions were created through Act 231 for new programmatic  
38 units within Plant Quarantine for export certification, investigation, compliance, military,  
39 and then rapid response which would also include a reorganization of the existing  
40 structure.

41

1 Mr. Ho stated that the department is working with the Department of Human Resources  
2 and Leeward Community College to establish a Biosecurity Academy modeled after  
3 what New Zealand utilizes. This will create a pathway for people to go through an  
4 academy with a goal to train recruits during probation.

5  
6 Mr. Ho spoke about the Christmas tree imports and said last year, there were 120  
7 containers that were imported and 4 of those containers required treatment because  
8 they contained either slug or yellow jackets. This was about a 96.7% compliance rate.  
9 He attributed our success to decades-long partnerships with Oregon and Washington  
10 Departments of Agriculture.
